UNWANTED: INVASIVE SPECIES

Dalmatian Toadflax (Linaria dalmatica)

Dalmatian toadflax is a weed that grows between 2.5 to 5 feet tall, and multiple stems can grow from a single base. It has waxy blue-green leaves that alternate along the stem. The leaves are wedge shaped.



The flowers are yellow, sometimes with white highlights, and they have long tails, similar to snapdragons. Toadflax blooms in the late spring into the summer.

Toadflax reproduces via roots and small black seeds.

Keep from picking flowers or seedheads to prevent spreading. If picked, leave parts of this plant where they were originally found.



Toadflax may be harmful to livestock. It is strongly competitive and outcompetes native plants, decreasing their amounts and harming the environment.
